

AUTHOR'S NOTE Sweeney Todd

THE DEMON BARBER OF FLEET STREET

There have been at least seven versions of Sweeney Todd since George Dibdin-Pitt's original melodrama was first performed in 1847 at The Britannia, a London "Bloodbath" theater whose admirable objective was to stun its audiences with a holocaust of thrills, horrors and shocks. But even before this Sweeney Todd, the legendary and mad barber, was the hero of a "penny dreadful" (one of the news sheets sold on street corners in Victorian days) and since

then for more than a century
in England he has become a
household word. "Sweeney Todd
will get you if you don't watch out"
has been more than enough to send
countless thousands of recalcitrant
children scurrying to finish their
porridge or to jump into bed on time.
However, it is not only the children who
are haunted by Sweeney Todd. He is the
demon, the half-admitted shadowy lodger, who
lurks in the back of all our minds. Not a

WHO'S WHO in the CAST

ANGELA LANSBURY (Mrs. Lovett) has joined forces again with Stephen Sondheim, Hugh Wheeler and Harold Prince for Sweeney Todd. She starred in Mr. Sondheim's musical Anyone Can Whistle and in London and New York in Gypsy. She made her Broadway debut in Hotel Paradiso and subsequently played in A Taste of Honey with Joan Plowright. She won the Tony Award and the New York Drama Critics' Award for her performance in the title role of the musical Mame and a Tony Award for Dear World, as the 75-year-old Madwoman of Chaillot. In London while playing Rose in Gypsy,

she won the London Theatre Critics' Plays and Players Award (the first time it was presented to an actress in a musical role). When she repeated the role in the U.S. she was rewarded with her third Tony, The New York Drama Desk Award and The Sarah Siddons Society Award. Miss Lansbury appeared with the Royal Shakespeare Company in Edward Albee's All Over and as Gertrude to Albert Finney's Hamlet at the National Theatre in London. She appeared at the Hartford Stage Company in the U.S. premiere of two one act plays, Counting The Ways and Listening, written and directed by Edward

Albee. Miss Lansbury was directed by Mr. Prince in the film Something For Everyone from the screenplay by Hugh Wheeler. Her first film role, at the age of 17, was in Gaslight, for which she was nominated for an Academy Award. Her other films include The Picture of Dorian Grey (Academy Award nomination), National Velvet, The Harvey Girls, If Winter Comes, Till the Clouds Roll By, State of the Union, Samson and Delilah, Bel Ami, The Long Hot Summer, Dark at the Top of the Stairs, All Fall Down, The Manchurian Candidate (Academy Award nomination), Bedknobs and Broomsticks, Death On The Nile and the soon to be released The Lady Vanishes.

LEN CARIOU (Sweeney Todd) was seen last season in the highly acclaimed Cold Storage. His last musical performance was in the Prince-Sondheim-Wheeler musical A Little Night Music, for which he won a Tony nomination. He repeated his role in the movie version. His other Broadway credits include Night Watch and Applause, for which he received another Tony nomination and the Theatre World Award. For the Phoenix Theatre he performed the powerful one man drama A Sorrow Beyond Dreams. His directorial credits in New York include Don't Call Back for Broadway and The Petrified Forest off-Broadway. A native of Canada, he began his professional career at the Winnipeg Rainbow Stage Theatre, subsequently joining the Manitoba Theatre Centre appearing in Mr. Roberts, The Taming of the Shrew, Mother Courage and Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?. For Stratford, Ontario's Shakespeare Festival, Mr. Cariou played leads in Bourgeois Gentilhomme, Timon of Athens and Mahagonny. He was a member of the Guthrie Theatre, appearing in The Skin

of Our Teeth, As You Like It as Orestes in Dr. Guthrie's production of The Oresteia, which came to New York, Serjeant Musgrave's Dance and Twelfth Night. He played Iago in Othello in Chicago and starred in the American Shakespeare Festival productions of Much Ado About Nothing, The Three Sisters and Henry V (repeated on Broadway for a limited engagement). Returning to the Guthrie, he was appointed Associate Director and was seen in The Taming of the Shrew, The Diary of A Scoundrel, Cyrano de Bergerac, King Lear, Oedipus the King, and directed Of Mice and Men and The Crucible. He served for a season as Artistic Director for the Manitoba Theatre Centre, starring in Equus, Cyrano de Bergerac, and directing Of Mice and Men. For CBS Television he recently starred in "Who'll Save Our Children?." His most recent film is from the National Film Board in Canada entitled One Man.

VICTOR GARBER (Anthony) received a Tony Award nomination for his performance in the current Broadway hit Deathtrap and a Theatre World Award for the off-Broadway production of Ibsen's Ghosts. His regional theatre credits include The Ahmanson Theatre, The Philadelphia Drama Guild, The Long Wharf Theatre, The Yale Repertory Theatre and The American Shakespeare Festival. On television he was seen in the Theatre in America production of "Ah Wilderness!," Opera Theatre's "Jack: A Flash Fantasy" with Gilda Radner, Hallmark Hall of Fame's "Valley Forge" and as Teddy Wheeler in the PBS series "The Best Of Families." Among Mr. Garber's film credits is Jesus in Godspell. He and Don Scardino continue to perform their own original music in cabarets throughout New York City.

KEN JENNINGS (Tobias) appeared on Broadway as Shorty in the Circle in the Square production of All God's Chillun Got Wings, directed by George C. Scott. This past summer he enjoyed playing Arpad in She Loves Me at the Goodspeed Opera House. He has performed the Artful Dodger in Oliver at the Papermill Playhouse, Pittsburgh Civic Light Opera and The Chateau de Ville Dinner Theatre.

MERLE LOUISE (Beggar Woman) was featured in the original Broadway cast of Company. Broadway also saw her as Ethel Merman's daughter, June, in Gypsy. In regional theatre she played leading roles in A Doll's House, Pygmalion, Romeo and Juliet, Twelfth Night, Bus Stop and School For Wives. Various musical theatres have seen her in I Do! I Do!, Seesaw and Threepenny Opera. Last summer she appeared with Jean Stapleton in Little Mary Sunshine. She is the mother of three children and 27 mice.

EDMUND LYNDECK (Judge Turpin) created the role of Rev. Witherspoon in the Broadway production of 1776, later succeeding to the starring role of Dickenson in the national company. He supported Deborah Kerr in the Los Angeles tryout of Souvenir, and Ruth Gordon and Lynn Redgrave in Mrs. Warren's Profession at Lincoln Center. Last on Broadway in Piaf-A Remembrance, he was Louis Leplee, Piaf's discoverer. His regional theatre roles include the Coach in That Championship Season, Claudius in Hamlet, Con Melody in A Touch of the Poet, Walter Burns in The Front Page, and Rev. Anderson in The Devil's Disciple. Last summer he was Jean Stapleton's leading man in The Great Sebastians and Daisy Mayme at the Totem Pole Playhouse. Fans of TV's "The Doctors" will remember him as Dr. Carl Hendryx.

SARAH RICE (Johanna) began her professional career off-Broadway as the Girl in The Fantasticks. Since then she has sung the leading soprano roles in Candide, The Medium, Rigoletto, The Impresario, A Christmas Carol (World premiere), Hansel And Gretel, Regina and The Marriage of Figaro, with companies that include The Minnesota Opera Company, Eastern Opera Theatre, Aspen Music Festival and Michigan Opera Theatre. She performed Anne in A Little Night Music, and Miranda in The Tempest. Various other credits include the original cast recording of Your Arms Too Short to Box with God and an appearance in WNET's "The Boar Of Families." Miss Rice attended Arizona State University and currently studies voice with Ellen Faull of The New York City Opera. Sweeney Todd marks her Broadway debut.

JOAQUIN ROMAGUERA (Pirelli) received his early training with the Miami Opera Guild. In New York, after one and a half years at Radio City Music Hall, he joined the New York City Opera in 1965. He has appeared in over 60 operatic roles. In stock and regional theatre, Mr. Romaguera, performed in more than 24 musical comedies. In 1977 he directed Aida for the Colorado Opera Festival. In between his opera and theatre assignments, he has raised three beautiful children: Racine, Pallas and Joaquin Romaguera III. In his own words, "a poor man's dynasty." JACK ERIC WILLIAMS (The Beadle) has a wide background in the recording industry, and has done cabaret performances at such places as The Ballroom and Reno Sweeney. A composer, Mr. Williams has been a recipient of numerous prizes and commissions, including the NEA for his operas theatre pieces, chamber music, choral and orchestral works. He made his Broadway debut at Lincoln Center in Threepenny Opera directed by Richard Foreman. Also for Mr. Foreman, he appeared in Strong Medicine, Foreman's yet unreleased first film. In early 1978 Mr. Williams worked in the La Mama CETA company appearing in Tom O'Horgan's Tempest. Most recently, he portrayed Havlitschek in an American premiere of Horvath's Tales from the Vienna Woods, directed by David Chambers at Washington's Arena Stage.

MAGGIE TASK (Understudy to Mrs. Lovett) has appeared in 14 Broadway productions including A Matter of Gravity, Coco (both with Katharine Hepburn), Look to the Lilies, Hyman Kaplan, Tovarich, Anya, Funny Girl, Greenwillow and Kelly. Twenty-two years of stock productions and tours include The Sound of Music at Jones Beach, rounded off with many commercials squeezing bread, sipping soft drinks and choosing a bank.

WALTER CHARLES (Understudy to Sweeney Todd) appeared on Broadway in Grease and 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue and in the pre-Broadway tryout of The Prince of Grand Street. He was in the first national company of 1776 and in stock played leading roles in Guys and Dolls and Man of La Mancha. Mr. Charles was featured in the Town Hall production of Knickerbocker Holiday with Richard Kiley and on the daytime television serial "All My Children."

HAROLD PRINCE (Director) directed the current musical hits On The Twentieth Century (Broadway) and Evita (London) which will soon come to America. He has worked in the capacities of director and producer for the musicals Pacific Overtures, Candide (with the Chelsea Theatre), A Little Night Music, Follies, Company, Zorba, Cabaret, Superman and She Loves Me!. He produced The Pajama Game, Damn Yankees, New Girl in Town, (all three with Frederick Brisson and Robert Griffith), West Side Story (with Robert Griffith and Roger L. Stevens), and Fiorello! (with Robert Griffith). In addition Mr. Prince produced Take Her She's Mine, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Poor Bitos, Fiddler on the Roof and Side by Side by Sondheim. For the New Phoenix Repertory Company, he directed revivals of O'Neill's The Great God Brown, Duerrenmatt's The Visit and Congreve's Love For Love. Mr. Prince directed the films Something for Everyone and A Little Night Music. He staged the American premiere of Israeli composer Josef Tal's opera Ashmedai for the New York City Opera and The Girl of the Golden West for the Chicago Opera Company.

STEPHEN SONDHEIM (Composer-Lyricist) won Tony Awards as Best Composer and Lyricist for three consecutive years for Company, Follies, and A Little Night Music. All three of these musicals won the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award, as did his Pacific Overtures. His ascent on Broadway began with his lyrics for West Side Story, Gypsy and Do I Hear a Waltz? and continued with music and lyrics for A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum and Anyone Can Whistle. Side by Side by Sondheim, an evening of songs from the above shows, originated in London, moved to Broadway and is currently touring the United States. He provided incidental music for Broadway's Twigs, Girls of Summer and Invitation to a March. He co-authored the film The Last of Sheila with Anthony Perkins, wrote additional lyrics for the Broadway revival of Candide, composed the musical score for the Alain Resnais film Stavisky and the music and lyrics for Burt Shevelove's adaptation of Aristophanes' The Frogs (which premiered in the Yale University swimming pool). Mr. Sondheim was born and raised in New York City and graduated from Williams College, winning the Hutchinson Prize for Musical Composition. After graduation, he studied theory and composition with Milton Babbitt. He

is currently president of the Dramatists Guild, the national association of playwrights, composers and lyricists.

HUGH WHEELER (Author) won Tony Awards for the books of Candide and A Little Night Music. He also wrote the book for the revival of *Irene*, and the plays *Big* Fish, Little Fish, Look: We've Come Through, We Have Always Lived in the Castle, and additional material for Pacific Overtures. For films he wrote the screenplays for Travels With My Aunt, Something For Everyone, A Little Night Music (the latter two directed by Mr. Prince) and the forthcoming Nijinsky, directed by Herbert Ross. For 20 odd years he has written mysteries under the pseudonyms Patrick Quentin and Q. Patrick, including Puzzle For Fools, Puzzle For Players, Puzzle For Puppets, Puzzle For Wantons and Puzzle For Fiends. Four of his novels have been transformed into films—Black Widow, Man in the Net, The Green-Eyed Monster and The Man With Two Wives.

CHRISTOPHER BOND is a London born actor, writer and director who is currently the Artistic Director of the Everyman Theatre Company, Liverpool. Other plays by Mr. Bond include Downright Hooligan, Judge Jeffries and Under New Management.

LARRY FULLER (Dance and Movement) recently choreographed Broadway's
On The Twentieth Century and London's
Evita, both directed by Mr. Prince. He recreated the original musical staging for
Funny Girl in London, starring Barbra
Streisand. He directed and choreographed
the first European productions of Candide,
Girl Crazy and On The Town and four
German productions of West Side Story.
In Vienna he created a very successful
ballet evening, Jazz and the Dancing
Americans. On Broadway he also staged
the dances for That's Entertainment and
Blood Red Roses.

EUGENE and FRANNE LEE (Production & Costume Designers) have done
many productions with Mr. Prince, starting with Candide, which won them both
Tony Awards, etc., and including the most
recent, the opera Girl of the Golden West.
Currently, and for the last four years, they
have been the production and costume designers for the popular television show
"Saturday Night Live." From their meeting in Philadelphia 10 years ago, the creative partnership has led to designing Leroy
Jones' Slaveship, Andre Gregory's Alice
In Wonderland, Peter Brooks' Orghast,
Lorne Michael's "Paul Simon Special" and

KEN BILLINGTON (Lighting Designer) designed the Broadway productions of On The Twentieth Century, Side by Side by Sondheim, Do You Turn Somersaults?, Ethel Merman & Mary Martin Together On Broadway and the revivals of Fiddler on the Roof and Sweet Bird of Youth. He received Tony nominations for Working and the revival of The Visit. Other projects include concert and nightclub lighting for Ann-Margret, Shirley MacLaine, and others. Mr. Billington designed lighting for Chicago Lyric Opera's La Fran-ciulla Del West, The Dallas Civic Opera, Le Coq D'Or, New York City Opera's The Merry Widow, Naughty Marietta, The Voice of Ariadne and Ashmedai.

JONATHAN TUNICK (Orchestrator) orchestrated the Broadway productions of Ballroom, Pacific Overtures, A Little Night Music, Follies, Company and Promises, Promises, as well as Leonard Bernstein's Mass and such films as Blazing Saddles, Young Frankenstein and Stavisky. In addition to his distinguished career as a theatre orchestrator, he is an active composer, having contributed scores to such television series as "Columbo" and "Flying High," as well as having received commissions from the Pennsylvania Ballet, the New York Shakespeare Festival and Benny Goodman. In 1978 he received an Academy Award for his adaptation score for the film A Little Night Music.

PAUL GEMIGNANI (Musical Director) has been the musical director for the Broadway productions of On The Twentieth Century, Side by Side by Sondheim, Music Is, Pacific Overtures, Candide, A Little Night Music, Follies, Sondheim, A Musical Tribute and the national company of Zorba. He has composed the score for the film Children of Paris, and served as musical director on the film A Little Night Music.

RUTH MITCHELL (Assistant to Mr. Prince) has served as associate producer and/or production stage manager on sixteen Harold Prince shows including Company, Follies and A Little Night Music. She was assistant director to Mr. Prince on the film A Little Night Music and the musical On The Twentieth Century. She reproduced the original Jerome Robbins direction of Fiddler on the Roof.

RICHARD BARR has produced almost all of Edward Albee's plays including Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?. CHAR-LES WOODWARD produced Joe Orton's What The Butler Saw. Among the many plays they have presented together are The Boys in the Band, The Front Page, The Last of Mrs. Lincoln, All Over and Seascape.

ROBERT FRYER, MARY LEA JOHN-SON, MARTIN RICHARDS, partners in The Producer Circle Co., presented the musical On The Twentieth Century, the recent film, The Boys From Brazil, are completing another film, The Shining, and a Cy Coleman/James Lipton musical Encounter. Their first joint venture was The Norman Conquests. Fryer and Richards co-produced the musical, Chicago and with Allan Carr, Producer Circle will do the film. Fryer is Managing Director of the Ahmanson Theatre in Los Angeles, and has produced many Broadway hits. Prior to the partnership, Richards headed a leading New York casting office and coproduced the award-winning revival of Dylan.

DEAN & JUDY MANOS are producing together for the first time on Sweeney Todd. She began her producing association with Barr and Woodward with The Grass Harp.

MARC HOWARD and his production company, Yarbleset International, co-produced the 1978 Tony Award winner, Da. They are currently casting the female lead for Abrams, a love story about a boy and his pig. Mr. Howard has various bad habits as hobbies and never shaves in public places.
